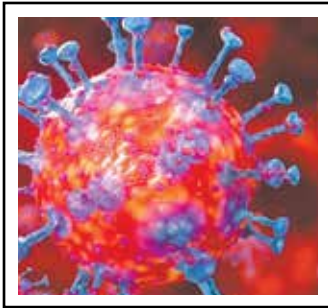

It's back to the office for many

On Monday, May 10, Governor Gretchen Whitmer's office put out a new press release, this one to proclaim 55 percent of Michigan residents are at least partially vaccinated.

And that's a critical figure in the grand scheme of things. A grand scheme called "MI Vacc to Normal" – as in, "back to normal."

Which is the ultimate goal, after all.

In this instance, the "55 percent" figure enables all in-person work to resume, in every sector of the economy all across the state, on May 24.

In this slow and jagged march "vacc" to normal, that's an important milestone.

She released a video praising the effort of the state's citizens in doing their part to help get things back on track.

The state has admin-

Concern raised over officers' encounter with a mentally disturbed person

Last Friday, Hamtramck social media blew up over how three Hamtramck police officers handled a man causing a disturbance in Veterans Memorial Park and nearby.

In a recording shot by a bystander, the officers are seen talking with a man who appeared agitated.

There was no audio of what the officers and the man said to each other.

The officers eventually tackled the man to the ground and struggled to handcuff him.

At one point an officer took out a baton and attempted to extend it by flicking it – but some thought it appeared the officer was striking the man.

We asked Police Chief Anne Moise for an explanation of what happened.

She issued this statement:

"May 3, 2021, Hamtramck Police officers received a call for assistance from a local religious institution.

"An individual, with whom Hamtramck officers are familiar from prior encounters, was having a mental health episode in which he was refusing to leave and causing a disturbance. The officers located the individual at Veteran's Park.

"A bystander video showed only a portion of a longer conversation between the responding officers, all of whom have received training on the appropriate use of force and on responding to incidents involving mental health

emergencies.

"There is no audio of the conversation, but officers attempted to orient the individual to self, place and time. The individual responded by growling at the officers and by repeating the questions the officers were asking.

"After several minutes, it became clear to the officers that the individual needed medical attention and his erratic behavior posed a potential threat to the public and potentially to the individual. The individual refused verbal com-

mands to submit to a pat down for weapons. “The appropriate application of minimal force was used to bring the individual under control. A collapsible baton was appropriately deployed to pry the individual’s arm loose for handcuffing. In order to use the collapsible baton, the officer must shake it

with his hand to extend it. “At no time did any officer kneel on the individual’s neck or restrict his breathing. The individual was not arrested. He was transported to Detroit Receiving Hospital where the individual received the behavioral health services he needed. “Neither the officers nor the individual received any

injuries.” On a Facebook page called “Hamtramck Square,” some people were critical of the officers. Former City Councilmember Phill Kwik said: “The biggest problem is calling the police for everything, even when they have no business being there. This is a mental health

issue; we need mental health experts on the staff of the City. “This is exactly why we need to reduce the police budget and put the money into community services that actually benefit the community. Are we a compassionate community or do we just call the cops for everything?”



Covid update

Mayor: Get vaccinated so we can return to ‘normal’

For the second week in a row, Mayor Karen Majewski was pleased to report that the number of new COVID-19 cases went down.

This past week, Majewski said there were 63 new cases reported – compared to the week prior, when there were 93.

In the weeks before that, there were over 100 reported each week.

That drop in cases reflects what is also happening statewide.

Unfortunately, two deaths were reported, but the mayor said those deaths actually occurred in April.

Those residents were both females, with one being 71 and the other 67 years old.

So, the total number of Covid deaths for the past year in Hamtramck is 2,484, and the number of deaths is at 47.

One big reason there has been a decrease in the numbers is that more and more people in Michigan are getting vaccinations. In fact, as the mayor pointed out in her weekly talk with the community via Facebook, there is no shortage of places to get a vaccine – just in case you have not gotten around to doing that.

One of the easiest ways to find out where to get a vaccine is to go online to vaccine.gov and then plug in your zip code. All of the nearby locations to get a shot will pop up.

Some of the local vaccine locations include:

- Wayne County Healthy Communities – 9201 Jos. Campau.

For those who are homebound, there is even a mobile unit that will come to your residence. For more information, call city hall at (313) 800-5208.

“We want everybody to get vaccinated, and get things back to some semblance of normalcy – what passes as normal in Hamtramck,” Majewski said, with a twist of humor.

(Editor’s note: There is a local saying that goes: “Only in Hamtramck.”)

The mayor ran down the usual federal and state financial assistance programs, which you can find out more about by going to the City of Hamtramck Facebook page.

One federal help program of particular interest for many Hamtramck businesses is a program tailored for any establishment that serves food.

This program is called the Restaurant Revitalization Fund, and so far, it’s proved popular. Majewski said over 186,000 establishments nationwide have applied for this Small Business Administration grant. You can apply online at the sba.gov website.

For the first 21 days, the program will favor women-owned businesses as well veteran-owned ones, and those run by persons who are economically disadvantaged.

There is only so much funding being made available, so get your application in now.

Majewski also noted that there was a recent court ruling that struck down the moratorium on landlords evicting folks who fell behind on rent.

There have been federal grants for both landlords and renters, to get them over these economically distressed times.

Although the court has ruled against this, President Biden’s administration is appealing the decision, meaning the court ruling is not in effect yet.

Haven’t filed your income taxes yet?

Rest easy – well, sort of.

The deadline to file state and federal income taxes has been extended to May 17 – which is this

coming Monday.

Hamtramck’s income tax filing deadline has been pushed back to June 1.

The Caniff Ave. rebuild project is ongoing, and will be for most of the summer, said Majewski. Caniff is now closed between the I-75 service drive and Jos. Campau.

That part of Caniff is a main artery to get into the city, so you can just imagine the traffic confusion. The good news? The federal government is paying for most of the project.

So, what can a mayor possibly say to soften the inconvenience?

“It’s all for good – all for progress,” she said.

In other traffic news, Majewski said the city will be installing two speed humps, one on Charest near the high school, and the other one on Hanley St. near Tau Beta Elementary School.

“Getting around Hamtramck will be a slow-go, and maybe slow-go is better,” she said.

It gave the council time to reflect on the issue, and get more input from the community. While the eventual resolution that was passed doesn't provide much in the line of muscle to enforce any laws, it does welcome more community input. As for getting police officers involved, there are still plenty of state laws on the books that do address the matter. The Review listed those laws in a recent issue, and you can read what those laws are on our website. In the meantime, we encourage our local schools to set up an education program addressing the matter. Need to know more about this issue? There are plenty of websites offering invaluable information on how to combat this problem, which—in Hamtramck—has gone on far too long.

Two families are now homeless after house fire

The first week of May proved to be bad luck for two houses in Hamtramck. According to Fire Chief Danny Hagen, on May 2, firefighters reacted to what was initially described as a “backyard fire” in the 3000 block of Lehman St. Upon their arrival, it turned out to be a two-family house on fire, in the back. “The fire on the first floor had heavy damage to the rear outside and kitchen area,” said Hagen, in an email to The Review. The fire also spread next-door, causing “exterior siding damage,” he said. Also, another neighboring house was damaged. The occupant of the house where the fire started was not harmed, he said. The cause is being blamed on an electrical issue. And then, two days later (on May 4), fire erupted at a two-family dwelling across from city hall. Detroit and Highland Park firefighters both assisted. The fire damaged both floors, and forced the families living there to seek shelter elsewhere. In the meantime, Hagen was able to get the Red Cross involved with helping the families. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

State Rep. Aiyash addresses unemployment pay issue

Hamtramck's new state representative teamed up with four other legislators to address covid-related relief issues. District 4 State Rep. Abraham Aiyash worked alongside Mary Cavanaugh (District 10), Helena Scott (District 7), familiar gubernatorial race name Shri Thanedar (District 3) and Stephanie Young (District 8) to produce the five-bill grouping, meant to offer help during the pandemic. The details were laid out in a press release issued by the Michigan House. Aiyash, who lives in Hamtramck, introduced House Bill 4772, which will reform the state's UIA

benefit formula so that persons currently receiving unemployment can earn up to half of their benefits through temporary or part-time work before seeing those benefits reduced. “This bill will incentivize people to work as the economy opens up, while

allowing them to still collect unemployment benefits so they can pay rent and meet their family's needs,” Aiyash said in the press release. Other bills address different things, such as storage unit payments, tax credits for small businesses and frontline workers, and work share program layoffs. Each of the bills was crafted, the release said, in response to specific issues raised in the lawmakers' communities. What parents should know about sending their child to kindergarten

Administration building at 3201 Roosevelt.

Review: Is there a way for parents to determine whether their child is ready for school?

Blankenbaker: Considering your child's current pre-academic skills (writes name or recognizes letters in name, counting), social skills (follows simple directions, feels comfortable in group), and physical skills (manages bathroom skills, holds a pencil/crayon, hops, skips) can help parents decide if their child is ready for the kindergarten transition.

When in doubt, contact your child's pre-k teacher, pediatrician, or someone who can provide an unbiased opinion about your child's ability to meet the expectations of kindergarten.

Review: What is the goal in kindergarten?

Blankenbaker: The goal for kindergarten is to establish friendships, learn how to be a student, develop letter/sound identification, begin learning to read, know number names, count objects, compare numbers and add/subtract. Students will also begin to explore the social studies concepts of community, and basic science principles.

Review: What kind of a day (schedule) do those in kindergarten go through?

Blankenbaker: A typical day in kindergarten consists of specific times designated to give students several opportunities to learn, explore, create, manipulate and question through meaningful activities.

The goal is for each child is to learn and to be challenged at his/her own individual level. Schedules

can vary, based on your school and classroom teacher; however, a typical schedule will include: Daily schedule: morning meetings/greetings, language arts, reading and writing, lunch, recess, quiet time/read-alouds, mathematics, science/social studies, hands-on activities, choice activities, and closing meetings.

Special classes include: art, music, physical education or library. Students will attend at least one per day.

Review: What should parents do when their child returns home? Should they ask about their day, and what they learned?

Blankenbaker: Ask about their child's day, and have them share what they learned. Use the statement, "Tell me three things that you learned today," or "Name three things that made you feel happy."

Engaging in a conversation with your child will help them reflect on their day, and will improve their language proficiency skills, while keeping the parents informed on their child's learning.

Children will understand that their families are very interested in their education, and that education is important. Establishing this routine will pay off as students get older, and will open the communication

between parent and child.

Review: How can parents continue to nurture their kindergarten student?

Blankenbaker: Parents can nurture their child(ren) by reading to them daily, and by playing games that touch on the things they are learning in kindergarten. Ask your child to find certain letters on signs as you walk or drive, or count the steps as you walk down your front porch: use big words and explain what they mean.

Review: How will parents know if their child is adapting to school?

Blankenbaker: Parents are able to contact us, and receive updates, on a regular basis through email, telephone, or by using the Dojo app on their phone. Once that communication is established, teachers send information and updates to parents regularly.

Review: What are some helpful tips to help prepare

your child for the transition to kindergarten?

Blankenbaker:

- Help them develop independence at home
- Ask questions, to spark conversations and foster oral language
- Focus on self-help skills
- Develop and follow routines
- Engage them in meaningful literacy activities/Read-alouds
- Acknowledge their feelings
- Stay up-to-date on their vaccinations
- Have them practice counting things like plates on the table, people in the car, etc.
- Introduce them to reading by having them "read" signs that are familiar, like Kroger's, Walmart, "Stop," etc.
- Read to your child every night. It doesn't matter what language you read to them in
- Practice writing their name

ages 16 and up.

That would put us fully "vacc" to normal. Let us all hope for the day.

The next step in the process – 60 percent vaccinated – will, among other things, remove the current curfews on restaurants and bars, and increase many facility capacities to 25 percent.

A Summary of the changes are as follows:

All establishments and churches shall notify the City Clerk within two weeks after the effective date of this subchapter or within two weeks after receiving a mechanical container or effect changes to their collection that they have arranged for private disposal, the name of the disposal company, the size of the container, the frequency of collection, the location of the container and any other information the city may require.

The city shall require an annual registration fee for each mechanical container placed on public property and may tag the mechanical container.
