City has its hand out for federal infrastructure funding

Will Hamtramck see any of the newly passed national infrastructure funding?

That's the multi-million-dollar question city officials are pondering.

There is no shortage of needs here.

Recently, a \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill was passed by congress, and Michigan is slated to receive \$10 billion to fix bridges and roads, as well as for a slew of other projects.

But one of the key earmarks for the state's funding - and of keen interest to Hamtramck – is for replacing lead service lines for drinking water.

Hamtramck recently discovered, through a sample from six households, that the lead level was just over what is con-

sidered safe to consume. Many older households in the state are outfitted with lead water lines.

According to Mayor Karen Majewski, there is a good chance the city will see some funding coming this way, thanks to the re-



Arrest made in homicides

A 24-year-old Inkster man has been charged with the shooting deaths of a man and woman just a couple of weeks ago.

RayQuan Young has been charged with killing Khalileo Anderson and his girlfriend, De'Angelique Thomas, who were found dead in Anderson's apartment at the Rotana building on Oct. 28.

The Hamtramck Police Department issued a press release Saturday on the arrest of Young. The department is not releasing details of the incident, but it appears robbery could have been a motive.

Young is charged with two counts of homicide, two counts of armed robbery and four counts of a using a firearm in a felony. He was arraigned on Saturday (Nov. 13).

"After a thorough investigation, Hamtramck police detectives identified a suspect wanted in connection with the shooting," said the press release.

"The Hamtramck Police Detectives Department worked diligently on this investigation and would like to extend appreciation to our local, state and federal partners for their assistance with the investigation and subsequent arrest."

Young is now in the Wayne County jail, and his next court appearance will be on Nov. 23.

Mayor: 'Step back' and return to masking up while in public

State authorities are saying that Michigan is experiencing a "fourth wave" of COVID-19 cases breaking out.

Hamtramck also appears to be riding that

According to Mayor Karen Majewski, in her weekly talk to the community through the city's Facebook page, the city had 33 new cases last week up from 28 in the week prior. It appears those numbers will continue to increase in the coming weeks.

"We're hearing about a fourth wave, and we seem to be in it here in Hamtramck," Majewski said.

The total for Covid cases in the city for the past two years is now 3,288, with 58 deaths.

Michigan is now one of the highest states experiencing new Covid cases. Almost 8,000 new cases were recorded in just three days recently.

The state has a total of 1,209,712 Covid cases, with 22,862 deaths, in the past two years.

year, Majewski noted that

more and more people are getting lax on masking up while going out in public. Also, she said, there are more public events being held – such as stadium concerts and sports events.

"It's time to step back and put some of those old safeguards in place and be more cautious," she said.

Switching gears, Majewski noted that there was a water filter giveaway this past week in city hall. The city will continue to offer free filters on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 8 a.m.-4 p.m., through the Public Services office.

You'll need your ID and a photo of your faucet to Just as she did last make sure you get the correct filter.

A sampling of six houses out of 42 tested for lead in the water revealed a slightly high lead level. News of that finding set off a panic in the city, and there have been a few free filter distributions in the past weeks- but those filters went fast.

Majewski reminded residents that there is nothing wrong with the water that Hamtramck gets from Detroit. The problem, she said, is with lead leaching into standing water in the water lines that goes into houses.

The best remedy, and it's free, is to run your water for a few minutes after it's been standing for some hours - such as overnight.

That will clear out any potentially lead contaminated water.

The city has already been replacing lead lines through a state mandate that requires all communities to replace their lead lines within 20 years.

The only snag is that the city is solely responsible for funding that project. Majewski said it will cost the city \$55 million to eventually replace all the lead lines.

About 500 lines have been replaced over the last two years, and 350 lines will be replaced next

Cross your fingers because there is a good chance, Majewski said, that Hamtramck will get a "significant infusion" of money through President Biden's infrastructure plan that was recently approved by Congress.

City officials are working with the governor's office to make sure Hamtramck gets a piece of the financial pie that the state is slated to receive.


Majewski also went through the usual topics from the past several weeks, such as financial aid for those in need and local food giveaways.

Proceeds from the sale are required, per state order, to be put into the city's pension system,

which is currently underfunded.

However, the city will also then collect revenue from property and income taxes.

Most of Hamtramck's current housing stock was built before 1939, according to the city.

At one time, the city's population was around 50,000 people. Over time, as residents moved to the suburbs, the population has dwindled down to about 22,000. The city's population has since increased back to

Policing issue raises a lot of questions

about in town, and all across the country, on whether communities should downsize their police departments.

Some say that instead of having officers answer some calls, it would be better to have social workers handle issues such as family disputes or people just misbehaving.

Recently, our city council rejected two proposals to hire additional police officers, the first proposal called for four officers to be added to the department, and

Much has been talked the second proposal requesting just three.

> The main reason given for the rejections centered around the cost to the city each year – over \$200,000.

For sure, that's a sizable chunk of change especially for a city that is in deficit spending, and burning through its budget surplus.

At the rate the city is spending, there is a good chance the budget surplus will be gone by this time next year.

Yet, at the same time, the city just added an additional \$180,000

to the budget to cover unexpected police overtime.

Would the hiring of officers offset that problem? Would it eliminate overtime? We doubt it.



Property tax payment plans are available now!

Interest Reduction Stipulated Payment Agreement (IRSPA)

This payment plan reduces the interest rate from 18% to 6% for eligible taxpayers. To sign up, you must own and live in your home, and have a Principal Residence Exemption (PRE) and ID that proves residency.

Stipulated Payment Agreement (SPA)

Available to everybody, this plan allows a taxpayer to pay taxes pursuant to a payment schedule. The plan will avoid foreclosure provided that payments are submitted per the agreed upon schedule.

Distressed Owner Occupant Extension (DOOE)

This program is not available to everyone. If you own and live in the property, and are suffering financial hardship you may qualify for this program. Proof of ownership, occupancy, and hardship are required.

Pay As You Stay Payment Agreement (PAYSPA)

Only for those who have first applied for their local municipality's Poverty Tax Exemption (PTE) and received an approval. Once notified by your local Assessor's office and deemed eligible, our office will mail you a notification letter with your Reduced Amount Due. You will have the option of paying a lump sum (additional 10% off) or enrolling into a PAYSPA.

The final date to enter into a payment plan wil be March 14, 2022, and the last day to pay your forfeited taxes will be March 31, 2022.
