

A year full of challenges was met with vigor.

It is with pleasure that I continue to serve the Hamtramck Public Schools, Students, Parents, Staff, and Community as a Director of Student Services. This year was full of challenges, some were easier to address than others.

As we resumed the school year in September, following approximately a year and a half of pandemic related remote learning, we were immediately challenged by the national shortage of bus drivers and buses that impacted our transportation services.

These challenges created many inconveniences

to our families and students, which we regret. We were able to resolve these challenges by working collaboratively with our transportation provider to secure drivers and buses for our students with special needs, and ensuring their transportation is prioritized.

The first few months of the school year were challenging in that regard. However, we were able to successfully resolve this

We continue our work meeting the towards needs of our students on the Autism Spectrum Dis-

In response to the national trend of early identification of students on the Autism Spectrum, and the rising incident rate in

this category of eligibility, this year we partnered with Wayne RESA for additional support and consultation that resulted in the district opening an

additional Autism classroom. By the start of the 2022-2023 school year, we aim to offer our community and students three (3) Autism Categorical Classroom Programs at the elementary level.

For the time being, preschool students eligible students can continue to receive services in the district on a walk-in basis or they can be referred for placement in our partner programs outside of the district. The Special Education Department continues to work with the

Hamtramck **Public** Schools to advocate for an Early Childhood Special Education Program.

Lastly, the district is seeking a parent representative to serve on the Wayne RESA Parent Advisory Committee (PAC). Interested parents must be parents of students currently receiving special education services in the Hamtramck Public Schools.

unique blossoms, constantly grow and thrive academically, emotionally, and socially.


Out of the total HPS enrollment, 63.4% of students are active Multilingual Learners (MLL). **ELD Department ensures** that various activities are facilitated throughout the school year to support our MLLs: planning and delivery of common core aligned English language instruction, conducting staff development, comstudents' municating progress to families by utilization of ELD progress reports, ensuring that data is periodically reviewed to inform, evaluate, and adjust instruction, targeting long term MLLs with Read 180, Math 180, and Systems 44 programs and other specific interventions,

ELD Department provides the infrastructure for assessment and alternative assessment of EL students (materials needs, training and scheduling), as well as identification, placement, and annual progress monitoring of MLLs.

HPS has a very active Parent Engagement Team and School and Community Facilitators who provide direct family support (food distribution, clothes, supplies, job resources, links people in need of medical care with free resources, etc.).

School and Community Facilitators help foster students and homeless families.

The ELD Department is an integral part of the HPS system. Whether a student comes to us as a newcomer, immigrant, refugee, a student with interrupted formal education or someone who experienced the American school system in a different state or a school district, they will be welcomed, their needs identified, and the appropriate system of support will be put in place for them.



### **Meeting the** needs of students at Horizon

The Michigan Department of Education defines a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) comprehensive comprised framework

of a collection of research-based strategies designed to meet the individual needs and assets of the whole child.

For MTSS, a school must first establish its tier 1, or universal supports. Universal supports are the instructional practices that help all students in a school. Once the universal supports are in place, staff

can use assessment data to determine which students need additional supports.

The intensity and duration of supports increase for tiers 2 and 3. The appropriate level of support for each student is determined by assessment data.

At Horizon equity-based MTSS is an organic response to meet students' individual needs. We remove barriers, interrupt inequitable situations, and cultivate opportunities based on student's individual goals

and plans. We encourage each student to define their own success and goals.

We provide a dynamic learning environment and supportive school culture to maximize their potential and increase motivation. We collaborate as a school with students, families, and the community. At Horizon we pride ourselves on being more individualized and discovering the unique backgrounds of each student.

To foster engagement and trust, we build strong relationships with our students. MTSS at Horizon is a priority.

### **Tau Beta Tigers** reflect and redefine success

Teachers collaborated throughout the District and we were able to analyze classroom data and measure student growth towards Michigan Common Core State Standards.

As 2021-22 comes to an end, we reflect on our past accomplishments and set new goals for 2022-23.

Tau Beta will continue to heighten our expectations for teaching and learning through the lense of our teachers, students, family, and community.
