City council finds itself in a mess over tax abatement vote

After weeks of delays, the city council finally voted Tuesday night to OK a 10-year tax abatement for development at the former Missant site.

But, as the city council meeting was ending, a serious problem arose: The council did not have enough members attending the meeting for a quorum.

As it turns out, since there was no quorum, every vote that happened at the meeting is now "null and void," said Interim City Manager Max Garbarino.

That meant a special meeting was scheduled to be held Thursday, Sept. 15, after The Review went to press, to re-do most of the votes on resolutions that happened at Tuesday's meeting.

The one item missing on Thursday's special meeting agenda, as of Thursday morning, was the tax abatement issue.

Garbarino told The Review the abatement issue will be taken up on the next regular council meeting on Sept. 27.

So how did Tuesday's

city council meeting ever realized, is that the mayor happen?

That's not so clear, but apparently there was an initial thought that the councilmembers three who showed up, Amanda Jaczkowski, Nayeem Choudhury and Mohammed Hassan, along with Mayor Ameer Ghalib, constituted the bare number of members to hold a meeting.

In other words, a quorum.

The only problem with that equation, it was later

is not considered a part of the city council. The mayor merely presides over the meeting, and in some specific matters can vote, such as on ordinances, and in case there is a need to break a tie vote.

The City Charter, Section 7-09 part (b), is specific about what qualifies as a council quorum, and it states that the mayor is not included in that head

State beefs up election security

All across the country there is growing concern about the safety of election workers for the upcoming Nov. 8 General Election.

There is particular worry over some poll watchers attempting to disrupt voters and the counting of ballots.

Michigan is no excep-

To beef up election security in the state, Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson has created an \$8 million fund for local and county communities to tap into to prepare for the election.

"My administration has worked with election clerks and law enforcement across the state to ensure they have the information and resources they need to protect voters and their rights, and voters can cast their ballot tomorrow confident they will be safe and their vote will be counted," Benson said in a recent press release.

"We will not tolerate any voter suppression or election interference attempts in Michigan."

In Hamtramck, Clerk Rana Faraj said that security has not been much of an issue - at least so far.

"Other than some campaigners harassing my door people, I can't think of anything at the moment," Faraj told The Re-

Hamtramck has been stranger when it comes to poll challengers confronting voters.

In a 1999 general election, a group of challengers called "Citizens for a Better Hamtramck" made a number of improper challenges to Arab and Bengali voters that the US Justice Department

there shall not be a quorum present shall be taken up and heard at such adjourned meeting, or at the next regular meeting."

A simple majority for the Hamtramck council is at least four members.

For weeks, the city council has been evenly divided over whether to grant a 10-year tax abatement for the Missant site, located on Conant near the county jail. Unlike most abatement requests that ask for a temporary 50-pertaxes, this one seeks to freeze its current tax payment for 10 years.

A developer plans to invest over \$18 million to tear down some decrepit buildings and develop the site for an online sales company. The 24-acre site also has environmental issues from when plastic auto parts were manufactured there.

councilmembers who showed up for the meeting were unanimous in granting the abatement, saying the city needs to welcome development.

The councilmembers who did not show up, Mohammed Alsomiri, Adam Albarmaki and Khalil Refai, are opposed to the abatement, saying that 10 years is too long. Councilmember Refai offered a counter-proposal

However, the developer has let it be known that Refai's proposal would be a deal breaker, and that the development would not move forward.

to limit it to six years.

The Review reached out for comment via email to the councilmembers who were absent from Tuesday's meeting as to why they did not attend, and whether it had anything to do with the abatement

None of them responded to The Review.

Review The also reached out to Mayor Ghalib over whether he thought there was a quorum, and why he voted on the abatement issue along with voting on other resolutions.

The abatement issue, which the mayor abstained on, is not a resolution that the mayor would normally vote on unless there is a tie vote that requires breaking.

In an email, Ghalib said:

"I knew that I only have to vote if my vote breaks the tie or makes a difference, or on ordinances, and I questioned that before the meeting, but all the city officials who were in the meeting, and whom I trusted and I still do trust, they agreed otherwise, including on the issue of the quorum. There was some confusion but it can be fixed.

"I want every city council member to take responsibility when it comes to big decisions. I will break the tie if enough city council members are there, and when there is a tie, I'll vote in the best interest of the city. Last night, regardless of the quorum issue, my vote wouldn't have made any difference so I abstained."

Abstaining on a vote is reserved for special circumstances.

According to Robert's Rule of Order, which the council follows, the following reasons are listed as to why elected and appointed officials abstain from voting:

· There's a conflict of

· They don't want to reveal what they're thinking about an issue

 They disagree with one or more board members, and don't want to air their disagreement

 They're too conflicted on an issue to cast a meaningful vote

· They have failed to research the matter sufficiently, and don't feel right about voting on it


· They're simply not focused enough on board activities

In the past, Ghalib has not offered his opinion on the abatement matter, but did reference concern over a past tax abatement with American Axle & Manufacturing.

When that abatement ended, the company shut down its plants and moved operations to a plant in Mexico - a move that burned a number of city officials.

But at Tuesday's council meeting, Ghalib did point out that the development at the Missant site would create 75 new jobs. Those jobs would generate additional income tax revenue for the city.

Previous to Tuesday's meeting, the council had pulled the proposal from the Aug. 23 meeting agenda for no apparent reason. At that time, it was the second delay in putting the matter forward for a vote.

said was race-based.

The registration form submitted by Citizens for a Better Hamtramck said that their interest was to keep the election "pure."

In a consent decree with the government, the city agreed to take a number of steps to ensure voters' rights.

There were no further incidents after that election but, for a number of years, Hamtramck elections were monitored by the Justice Department.

In the 2020 election year, there were a number

of incidents both in the metro area and nationwide, where poll watchers and challengers disrupted proceedings.

Hamtramck's 2020 election remained uneventful.

With this grant money being offered by the state, City Clerk Faraj said she will be purchasing new laptops for each precinct.

tramck until I moved here five years ago, since getting employment in the city.

However, I am still here, because it has fully captured my heart. This city has the most sensational and diverse people, cuisine, and accessibility that I have ever experienced in my well-traveled life. I don't want to live anywhere else now, which is why I just bought my very first home here, in the city, back in April.

The Review: What motivated you to start the Hamtramck LGBTQ Alliance Facebook group? Did you model it on any other group, or start it from scratch?

Hansknecht: tramck is a home for everyone, and a place where everyone can say their peace. This includes people who lack experience with Queer people and Queer culture and education on Queer history.

Members of our city government have been involved in multiple debates and conflicts surrounding Pride Month and pride flags, and as much as I was reading about people in support of, or against, the "issue," I did not see the "issue" speaking for themselves. I noticed a resounding lack of a collective Queer voice to reject the idea that our Queer existence is an "issue" at all.

Unfortunately, community's framing of LGBTQ identities as an "issue" to debate - instead of as inalienable human rights - has led to a rash of hateful actions beyond just words, as businesses and even personal homes have had their own symbols of Pride torn down or stolen.

I decided that, if I wanted to improve the situation of harassment and hate crimes in the city that I love, I would need help in bringing together allies and LGBTQ voices to speak up for ourselves, and change the face of the "debate" in this city.

I have served in many LGBTQ organizations in the past, so it is a truth to say that the HQA is modeled from those experiences, but we are just getting the ball rolling, and the final shape of our organization really is yet to be chosen by the people who want to make it.

The Review: You just started the group on July 15, and it already has over 140 members. Are you pleased with the response so far, and did you expect that level of interest?

Hansknecht: Since July 15, when I created the Facebook page, we are up to 154 members, most of whom joined within the first 24 hours.

I was beyond excited to see such a quick response to the group's creation, which leads me to believe others have felt the same way as I have for a while in this city.

Hansknecht: This group was posted to other Hamtramck Facebook pages, however, beyond the initial posting back in July, it has grown by word of mouth, and by friends inviting friends.

That being said, Facebook is not even close to representing the city, and so we hope to continue spreading awareness of our existence so those who want to find us can, including at this year's Labor Day festival - and by this news article.

The Review: Do you have any plans for any group activities, or is it meant to be primarily an online forum and safe space?

Hansknecht: We will be marching in the Hamtramck Labor Day parade (Editor's note: this interview was done prior to the parade), and our group does meet in person, typically twice a month on Thursday evenings: keep an eye on the Facebook page for full details of the meetings and events!

The Review: Do you have any links to any other Detroit area (or elsewhere) groups, or plans to link with, or to, any from your site?

Hansknecht: We will be marching this Labor Day with GM PLUS, which is a pride group amongst GM workers, and we are excited to keep bridging connections across communities in the Detroit area!

In this case, a tax abatement is justified

The city council can't seem to make a hard decision on a proposed tax abatement deal that, if approved, would lead to a major re-development.

The council either keeps putting off the issue, or can't even get a quorum to settle the matter. We won't get into the debacle of Tuesday's council meeting that is now null and void.

Maybe it's dawning on some of the councilmembers and mayor that, at times, they will have to make difficult decisions - decisions that some will like and others will strongly oppose.

That's the price of holding public office.

Back to the issue at hand: Tax abatements and Hamtramck have not always worked out for the best.

So, when the owner of the former Missant site recently proposed the abatement request, it opened up old wounds.

But, unlike other requests of this nature, this one is asking to have the current property taxes frozen for 10 years - as opposed to the usual request saying "no" and then for a 50-percent reduction in property taxes for 10 or more years.

The site generates \$60,000 in property taxes, of which the city receives about \$19,000.

We're not talking about a great sum of money here.

What the city gets in exchange is a major redevelopment of the site, where there are environmental issues as well from when plastic auto parts were manufactured there.

period comes to an end, then the city can reappraise the site and they likely will adjust the tax value up-

If the city declines to grant the request, all we continue to get is the \$60,000 a year in property taxes.

Hamtramck's number of new COVID-19 cases continues to slowly edge down.

According to Wayne County health officials, the number of new cases for the past week here (as of Monday) is 21. That brings the total number of cases for the past two years, since when the pandemic started, to

5,487. That number represents 18.4 percent of where the rate of new Hamtramck's population of about 29,000.

The number of deaths that same period remains

Nearly 1 in every 5 children is near-sighted or has a vision-impairment requiring glasses to see at school.

Many students who receive healthcare coverage through Medicaid also cannot access eye care due to low reimbursement rate or lack of locations that accept Medicaid.

Located in Hamtramck and featuring many bilingual staff members, Pearle Vision is easily accessible and welcoming to all families.

One of the best parts about working with students is getting to see their lives change for the better, whether that's through the robust academic program at Hamtramck Public Schools or upon receiving new glasses.

"My student was so joyful upon receiving her glasses," said Kristina Gerstacker, HPS teacher. "The new glasses have not only given her a confidence boost, but they've given her the opportunity to clearly see the world around her."

"During my decades as an educator, I have known many students that have received free glasses," said Christopher Wilinski, HPS teacher. "The effect is immediate. The students pay more attention and interact more during class discussions."

Roughly 800 students have benefited from Hamtramck SEES since its inception in 2017. Many of these students never had eyeglasses before and receiving them is a lifechanging event. The school district is proud to support its students in every way it can.

"Each and every student who has received glasses has displayed a huge positive shift in attitude when it comes to learning," said Samuel Bell, HPS teacher. "Instead of looking withdrawn and frustrated, these students are now happy to be involved with classmates and contribute to the classroom discussion."
