Get ready to vote

It's voting season again.

Applications for absentee ballots are now available at the Hamtramck City Clerk's Office, and also at any Secretary of State office.

Hamtramck City Clerk Rana Faraj said that, if you applied to get an absentee ballot for both the past primary and election and the upcoming November election, you will automatically get a ballot. You do not need to apply again.

However, if you applied for an absentee ballot only for the August Primary election, you will need to apply again for the Nov. 8 election.

The Nov. 8 election will determine, among other issues, whether Republicans or Democrats control congress for the next two years.

Voters who wish to vote by mail are encouraged to submit their applications as soon as possible to avoid postal delays.

Don't confuse voting absentee with voting, period – you first need to be registered to vote in your city or township.

This is all best outlined on Michigan.gov/Vote, but basically, in order to be legal to vote in the state, you must:

- Be 18 years old (by election day, so you can apply before that)
- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be a resident of the city or township you are voting in for at least 30 days prior to the date of the election, and
- Not be currently serving a prison or jail sentence (ask regarding a home arrest/tether situation)

Once you are registered, you can fill out your absentee ballot application.

Covid: Grim news for this week’s update

It’s been several months since Hamtramck reported a new death by COVID-19.

On Tuesday, that changed.

According to Wayne County health officials, the city indeed did record one additional death from the disease, bringing the total number of deaths in the city for the past two years, since when the pandemic began, to 75.

Otherwise, the number of new COVID-19 cases in Hamtramck continues to be in the 30-40 range per week.

To be exact, Hamtramck reported 32 new cases

last week (as of Monday), according to Wayne County health officials. That brings the total number of cases up to 5,463 for the past two years.

So, looking at the bigger picture, the Washington Post recently reported on what it means for the confluence of covid, monkeypox, global warming and travel, and the re-emergence of polio.

Add it all up, and the short answer, according to reporter Mark Johnson, is foreboding.

In one paragraph, in his talking with infectious-disease doctor Azfar Chak, he notes that all of this happening at once now:

“A third year of the coronavirus, driven by a more contagious variant. Global outbreaks of monkeypox and a mysterious hepatitis afflicting previously healthy children. Polio virus found in the sewage systems in London and New York. ...”

In short, global warming – along with the human population doubling in the last 50 years, to about 8 billion-plus, vanishing forests and more contact with animals, worldwide travel, and so on, Johnson reports, is a recipe for what is happening now.

And did we mention the tiger mosquito from Asia and what it can spread?

It’s enough to want to stay under your bed covers forever.

But is there hope? According to various media reports: Yes – and no.

Yes, in the sense that the immediate covid variant will phase out. No, though, in that who knows what the next one will be, and just how infectious.

The only certainty, various health officials say, is uncertainty.

One thing health experts agree on is to continue masking up while out in public – especially indoors. And it is still recommended to get vaccinations and boosters.

City Hall Insider ...

*What is our City Council up to these days?
We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.*

The city council met on July 12, and all councilmembers were in attendance, except for Councilmembers Adam Albarmaki and Khalil Refai.

Wayne County Commissioner Martha Scott, whose district includes Hamtramck, credited City Manager Kathy Angerer for “all the things she had done.”

(Angerer was about to resign and take a new job with the state.)

A presentation was made about the city’s pension fund with the Municipal Retirement System.

Sue Feinberg said that, as of June, the city’s funding level was at 45 percent, and that, by August of next year, that level will increase to 60 percent.

“You’re moving in the right direction,” Feinberg said.

She said that it will take the city 17 years to pay off the fund and that the city is likely to qualify for a \$17.6 million grant to help with pension funding.

“There are a lot of bugs to work out,” Feinberg

said about qualifying for the grant.

Angerer said that news of the city being in line to receive the grant “is one of the things that help me leave Hamtramck in a good place.”

Councilmember Amanda Jaczkowski said “It’s nice to hear good news.”

During public comment, Mark Koroι said that with Angerer leaving, Hamtramck is now at a “cross-road.”

He also noted that longtime City Attorney James Allen is also leaving. Koroι, an attorney, volunteered to be considered as a replacement for Allen.

“I know the city like the back of my hand,” said Koroι, who has been involved in past lawsuits filed against the city.

Barbara Beesley said she is part of a water board that is working toward making residential water bills affordable.

(After a two-year hiatus on residential water shut-offs, due to the pandemic, the city has resumed that practice.)

A man also spoke about the effort, saying “water

is a human right.”

A resident, who identified herself as a renter, spoke about a proposal to update the city’s rental inspection ordinance. The council is considering extending city rental inspections to every three years.

The resident objected to lengthening the time for inspections because it could lead to unsafe conditions.

The proposal, she said, will “negatively impact renters.... We should have more inspections.”

The proposal was made by Councilmember Mohammed Alsomiri. The issue came up for further discussion later in the meeting.

A representative of Hamtramck Mutual Aid said the program needs volunteers to do yard work for seniors.

Bill Meyer said that work will begin to create a park next to a mural celebrating the Yemeni community at Goodson and Jos. Campau.

A man who identified himself as a local Imam objected to a proposal to ban animal sacrifices at residences. He wondered if it was a “political stunt.”

The man also said this would not allow the Muslim community to fully practice their religion.

“Our children will lose our identity,” he said. “Cities are supposed to be sensitive to animal rituals.”

Mayor Ameer Ghalib, a Muslim, said that, while he does not practice this custom, he understands that some people feel “it’s better to do it yourself,” rather than have a butcher do it.

“It’s a moral reward,” Ghalib added.

Councilmember Nayeem Choudhury noted that Muslims only do animal sacrifices once a year.

He said the council should table this proposal for more discussion.

After further discussion, the council agreed to postpone taking a vote on the matter.

In another matter, the council agreed to sell a city lot at 3105 Goodson to allow for the construction of a single-family house.

The council considered whether to purchase five houses, a lot, and a lot with a garage on it, from Wayne County. The properties were lost to tax foreclosure.

The cost of all the properties was \$47,116.

Alternatively, the council could decide to let the county put the properties up for bid.

In the past, the city has taken both actions. If the city purchases the properties, it has to come up with a plan on how to dispose of them – either through marketing them, or allowing a developer to rehab and sell them.

Councilmember Choudhury suggested the city should allow the county to sell them off because there would soon be an interim city manager in charge, and that marketing the houses will be a burden.

But the rest of the council decided to purchase all of the properties.

In another action, the council agreed to prioritize which alleys should be reconstructed in the future.

The council then discussed the proposal to have the city manager review whether to increase the inspection time of rental properties by the city from every two years to every three years.

Councilmember Jaczkowski said the city should keep the two-year requirement because it protects renters.

She said that, if landlords can’t afford inspections once every two years, they should sell their properties.

“Two years is not a burden,” Jaczkowski said.

But Councilmember Choudhury said that every two years is too often.

“The landlord suffers a lot,” he said.

By that, he said he means renters often fail to pay their rent, and that inspectors are heavy-handed.

“They find every little thing,” Choudhury said.

Would-be renters, Choudhury said, can do their own inspections before moving in, and “move on” in their search for a place to live if they don’t like a certain house or apartment.

In the vote to have the city manager review the proposal, the council split 2-2. Mayor Ghalib broke the tie by agreeing with those who voted in favor of having the city manager to review proposal.

Those voting for the review were Councilmembers Mohammed Hassan and Choudhury, those opposing the review were Councilmembers Mohammed Alsomiri (who presented the proposal for council’s consideration) and Jaczkowski.

Odds & Ends

Helping hand... First, the rains flooded Hamtramck. Now, there's another kind of flood – a flood of relief, in a sense, for those who were (or may be) affected by the next big rain. FEMA – the Federal Emergency Management Agency – administers the NFIP, or National Flood Insurance Program. And Hamtramck has qualified to be in it, which means the citizens of this city are now able to purchase this protection through the Federal Government for up to the limits of the Regular Phase of the program (more on that in a moment). The city became eligible for this on Aug. 2, according to a press release they sent out on Aug. 29. Hamtramck thus joins some 22,000 other communities across the U.S. that are so eligible. Within those communities, more than 5 million people have these federal flood insurance policies. This status was due to the city having adopted ordinances intended to reduce losses from flooding, presumably including some significant infrastructure upgrades. The south end of the city, in particular, was often at risk. Federal grant monies had been obtained to help with this first of several phases that brought the city to this stature. So what are the fiscal limits of this insurance? For a single-family home, the coverage caps out at \$250,000 for the building itself, and \$100,000 more for the contents of the home. Renters may also purchase insurance to cover their belongings. Commercial properties go \$500,000 each, building and contents thereof. If you are buying a home in Hamtramck (or any other designated flood hazard area) on a federally backed mortgage, lenders must, yes must, require you to purchase flood insurance. This is in accordance with the Federal Disaster Protection Act of 1973, so it's been that way for almost 50 years now. Once your application has gone through, there is a 30-day waiting period for the flood insurance to go into effect. Go to www.fema.gov/fact-sheet/flood-insurance-and-nfip for more info. **Crime update...** For those wondering, this past weekend's Labor Day Festival went by with few incidents requiring police intervention. As with any time there are large gatherings, people can sometimes get in fights. There were at least two incidents reported where two large groups of people appeared to be getting ready to rumble, so to speak. 
