Firefighters to be honored

This will be of interest to anyone who has a spouse, relative or friend who is a firefighter, or to anyone who simply wants to show them support.

The National Fallen Firefighters Memorial was built in 1981 in Emmitsburg, Maryland, about 90 minutes outside of Washington D.C.

The dates of October 8-9 will mark the 41st Annual National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF) Memorial Week-end.

This year, they will honor 148 firefighters who died in the line of duty in 2021, plus several who died in previous years. This roll call will include, locally, Captain Jeffrey A. Brozich, 57, of the Madison Heights Fire Department, whose name will be inscribed on one of the memorial's bronze plaques.

St. Louis Fire Captain Garon Mosby will emcee a Remembrance Candle service on Saturday, Oct. 8 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. Then, Emmy Award-winning journalist Michelle Sigona will emcee the Sunday, Oct. 9, Memorial Service from 10:00 a.m. to noon at the National Fire Academy Campus at 16835 S. Seton Ave. in Emmitsburg.

Blame it on a lack of concrete.

That's the reason why Evaline, between Jos. Campau and Gallagher, had been blocked off.

Noticed we said "had been."

That's because a few days ago part of the street was finally opened to allow traffic to get through.

That portion of the street recently had the old lead water lines to homes replaced, a job that is now done.

But there is a concrete shortage, and that was holding up the reopening of the streets.

"This is an ongoing thing with supply and demand," said Bill Diamond, the Director of Public Services.

But there is a good chance, he said, that the portions of the street that were cut out can be resurfaced by this end of this week or next.

The clock is ticking if the city's contractor cannot get cement. Within the next couple of months, cold weather will prevent the pouring of cement.

So, Diamond said, the "worst case scenario" is that gravel will fill the

cutouts on the street, which will then have to be scooped back out later when concrete-pouring season returns in the spring.

The project is part of an overall plan to replace all the lead water lines to homes.

It has been estimated in the past that the cost to replace all the lead lines in the city is about \$55 million – or \$10,500 per household.

Funding, so far, has come from the federal infrastructure bill and other sources, although it's

not clear whether there is funding to replace all of the city's residential lead lines.

In the meantime, residents along Evaline have been complaining about not being able to park.

At Suzy's Bar, just down the street from Jos. Campau, owner Susan Briskey said the two-month street closure has been rough, financially-speaking.

"When most folks see a street blocked off, they go to another place. ... But I went into the hole," she said.

It has been so bad that

her friends held a fundraiser at the bar last Friday.

Despite the setback, Briskey said "Of course the job had to be done."

So why the concern over lead-lined water lines?

Hamtramck has had a history of high lead content in its water, for at least some houses.

High levels of lead in the water greatly affects children and their mental development.

You can have your lead levels checked at home for free by calling the county medical clinic at (313) 871-1926.

AV ballots to be mailed

Absentee ballots for the Nov. 8 election have been mailed out, or soon will be, to those who have so far requested them.

Absentee ballots are also available at all city clerk and township clerk offices.

Not registered?

You can to Michigan.gov/Vote and register there, up through Oct. 24. You can also register in person at the Hamtramck City Clerk's office up to, and even on, election day, and then vote right there immediately after registering.

The Secretary of State is another place that can register you – typically by appointment, however.

Michigan citizens voted overwhelmingly, in 2018, to put a law into our state Constitution providing all registered voters the right to vote absentee without having to provide a reason for doing so.

Confused as to why we are voting on the second Tuesday of November this year?

Elections fall on the first Tuesday that comes after the first Monday of the month. This year, the first Monday of November is on the 7th, and so we actually will be voting on the second Tuesday, Nov. 8.

So come on out – or stay in – and vote; whichever way you do it, just do it.

bits, and goats; pumpkin sale, donuts, crafts and even wall climbing – all at the school district’s Pulas-ki Park.

As you would expect, the country-life starved kids went right toward the animals. Toast knows ponies from way back, and these are the easiest-going of horses out there (although nothing against full-sized horses, which are pretty majestic creatures).

Now, over to Sunday, and the weather is still sunny and warm, but with a bit of a stiff wind putting a chill in the air.

Toast was at Hamtramck’s very own historic baseball stadium, located in the back of Veterans Park. It was the annual Ike Blessitt fundraiser baseball game.

Ike is a former Detroit Tiger, and he invited fellow Tiger Juan Berenguer to host the game. It was kind of a mini-baseball fantasy game where anyone could join in to play – for a token cost.

Sunday was extra special for Ike, who played for the Tigers in 1972, because it was his 73rd birthday.

And yes, there was birthday cake shared too.

Yes, summer is over, but baseball still continues in these waning weeks of the pro season.

Hamtramck’s baseball stadium is no ordinary stadium. No, indeed.

This was the homefield of the Detroit Stars, who were part of the Negro baseball league back in the 1920s and ‘30s when African-Americans were not allowed to play in baseball’s major leagues.

We’ve come a long way since then.

The stadium was built exclusively for the Ne-

gro league and, for many years, after that league dissolved, it just sat there slowly deteriorating until local historians discovered its unique importance.

How important?

The stadium is one of only a handful that survive to this day that exclusively served the Negro league.

In other words, we have a national historical jewel here.

Better yet, there has been an influx of federal and grant money that has helped restore the stadium grounds and grandstand. A big thanks goes out to the Friends of Historic Hamtramck Stadium for its huge contribution in doing research into the historic context of the stadium.

That information was a catalyst to renovating the stadium – which is still an

ongoing project.

It is an amazing experience to sit in the grandstands and look at the restored grounds – which has been maintained by the Hamtramck Stadium Grounds Crew.

At the game, in fact, were the two daughters of Detroit Stars’ legend Norman “Turkey” Stearnes.

Rosilyn Stearnes-Brown and Joyce Stearnes Thompson gave a soulful rendition of the national anthem to kick off the game.

All in all, Sunday was a great baseball day.

Covid: The disease continues its deadly course

Covid continued to claim lives in Hamtramck. Over the past two weeks, three additional residents died from COVID-19, bringing the total number for the past two years, when the pandemic started, to 79, according to Wayne County health officials.

And for the second week in a row, Hamtramck had 20 new COVID-19 cases as of this past Monday.

The total number of covid cases in Hamtramck now stands at 5,568.

There have been mixed reports on whether covid cases are going down for

good, or whether there will be another covid variant. There are now reports of variants appearing overseas that are resistant to vaccines.

In the meantime, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention still recommends getting vaccinated, as well as getting the current boosters.

Here is what the CDC has to say:

The introduction of the new boosters has caused some changes in vaccine recommendations, which are based on your age, the vaccine you first received, and time since your last dose:

- People ages 6 months

through 4 years should get all COVID-19 primary series doses.

- People ages 5 years and older should get all primary series doses, and the booster dose recommended for them by CDC.
- People ages 5 to 11 years are currently recommended to get the original (monovalent) booster.
- People ages 12 years and older are recommended to receive the updated Pfizer or Moderna bivalent booster.
- This includes people who have received all primary series doses and people who have previously received one or more original boosters.
- At this time, people ages 12 to 17 years can only receive the updated Pfizer bivalent booster.
- People who are moderately or severely immunocompromised have different recommendations for COVID-19 vaccines.


As for covid symptoms, in case you forgot, the CDC say they may appear

2-14 days after exposure to the virus. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Also, the CDC says to be on the look for emergency warning signs for COVID-19. If someone is showing any of these signs, seek emergency medical care immediately:

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake
- Pale, gray, or blue-colored skin, lips, or nail beds, depending on skin tone

are available now!

Interest Reduction Stipulated
Payment Agreement (IRSPA)

This payment plan reduces the interest rate from 18% to 6% for eligible taxpayers. To sign up, you must own and live in your home, and have a Principal Residence Exemption (PRE) and ID that proves residency.

Distressed Owner Occupant
Extension (DOOE)

This program is not available to everyone. If you own and live in the property, and are suffering financial hardship you may qualify for this program. Proof of ownership, occupancy, and hardship are required.

Stipulated Payment
Agreement (SPA)

Available to everybody, this plan allows a taxpayer to pay taxes pursuant to a payment schedule. The plan will avoid foreclosure provided that payments are submitted per the agreed upon schedule.

Pay As You Stay Payment
Agreement (PAYSPA)

Only for those who have first applied for their local municipality's Poverty Tax Exemption (PTE) and received an approval. Once notified by your local Assessor's office and deemed eligible, our office will mail you a notification letter with your Reduced Amount Due. You will have the option of paying a lump sum (additional 10% off) or enrolling into a PAYSPA.

The final date to enter into a payment plan will be **March 14, 2022**,
and the last day to pay your forfeited taxes will be **March 31, 2022**.

City council made the right decision on abatement

We realize it was no easy task deciding whether to grant a tax break to another company that promised the moon to the city.

Hamtramck has been burned by such promises before.

But the decision to grant a tax abatement to the company that plans to redevelop the former Missant site was the right choice.

This tax break is different than others in the past.

Instead of asking for a 50-percent property tax cut, the company sought to freeze the current tax payment for 10 years. After that period, the break expires, and the city can then assess the new property value.

Considering that a few decrepit buildings are going to be razed and a new one constructed, the value will certainly go up.

The site currently generates \$60,000 in property taxes per year.

If the council had rejected the offer, the city would then continue to receive the same amount with no hope of the site being developed.

It's been sitting pretty much vacant and blighted for decades.

What is disconcerting is how the city council arrived at its decision. The council appeared to be evenly divided on the issue, 3-3, and votes on the issue were delayed and put off for several weeks.

That was not a good message to send to would-be developers.

We've said this before, but the job of being on city council requires making tough decisions from time-to-time.

Running away from controversy is no way to conduct business in Hamtramck.

Be sure to have a plan in case of a home fire

October is Fire Prevention Month and to kick things off the National Fire Protection Agency and the Hamtramck Fire Department will be teaming up to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week from October 9 to October 15.

This year's theme is: "Fire won't wait, plan your escape."

Modern homes burn faster than ever, according to the NFPA, you may have as little as two minutes from the time the smoke alarm sounds to escape from a house fire. Therefore, it is important to have working smoke alarms and have an escape plan.

It's important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them!

The Hamtramck Fire Department recommends these key home fire escape planning tips:

- Make sure your plan meets the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home.
- Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows open easily.
- Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home where everyone should meet.
- Practice your home fire drill at least twice a year with everyone in the household, including guests. Practice at least once during the day and at night.

To kick off Fire Prevention week, The Hamtramck Fire Department is hosting an Open house on Sunday October 9 from noon until 3 p.m. at the fire station located at 2625 Caniff.

There will be activities, refreshments, and demonstrations of fire-fighting equipment.

That's why it's important to call the department as soon as you witness someone driving recklessly, and get as much information about the location and type of vehicle, and where they are heading.

Don't, however, attempt to chase down the drivers.
