

If you're like us, we crave nice long sunny days, where the sun doesn't set maybe until as late as 10 at night.



Midterm election is days away

Next Tuesday, Nov. 8, is the big day.

That's when Americans go to their local polls to vote in the midterm elec-

It's also the day when we all decide whether Democrats keep control of Congress, or whether Republicans claim a majority in one or both Congressional chambers.

This election is known as a "midterm" because it marks the halfway point of a newly-elected president's four-year term.

In Michigan, there are three state ballot proposals. Here's a recap of what they propose:

Proposal 22-1 would "amend the state constitution to require annual public financial disclosure reports by legislators and other state officers and change state legislator term limits to 12 total years in legislature."

Proposal 22-2 would "amend the state constitution to add provisions regarding elections."

Proposal 22-3 would "amend the state constitution to establish new individual right to reproductive freedom, including right to make all decisions about pregnancy and abortion; allow state to regulate abortion in some cases; and forbid prosecution of individuals exercising established right."

Besides voting on state and county races, Hamtramck voters will decide who fills two full-term positions on the Hamtramck School Board. There are three candidates vying for those two seats, and they



Covid: New symptoms are emerging as virus mutates

With colder weather right around the corner, health experts are warning about a covid "variant soup" that is likely heading our way.

On top of that, it's feared that this could be a bad flu season, along with another respiratory virus infection that could add up to be a triple whammy.

Locally, it appears the number of new COVID-19 cases in Hamtramck is ta-

During the past week (as of Monday), there were 13 new cases reported here - down from the 20-plus that have been reported each week for the past few months.

The new cases bring the total number for the two years-plus up to 5,648, with the number of deaths from the disease holding steady at 79 for the same time period.

To give some perspective, there have been over 97 million covid cases reported in the U.S., with over one million deaths.

It appears, too, that the symptoms of covid have changed a bit, with new variants emerging and spreading throughout the world - including in the U.S.

It's now being reported that the most common symptoms are: sore throat,

runny nose, blocked nose, persistent cough, headache - all in that order.

Vaccines and booster shots are still recommended as the best way to avoid catching the virus, or, if you do, then having less severe symptoms.

Besides vaccines and boosters, the other best protection comes from wearing a mask out in pub-

Mortadha Ali-Mudhaffar Obaid is running unopposed for a partial-term position.

State ballot Proposal 3 has garnered heated debate over whether women should have the right to get an abortion. Many voters of the Muslim faith are advocating voters to reject that proposal.

According to national and statewide polls, a majority of Americans and Michigan residents support women being able to get an abortion.

The issue has had some of the Muslim faith here in Hamtramck saying they will vote Republican because that party opposes abortion.

Hamtramck City Councilmember Adam Albarmaki initially announced on Facebook he would vote Republican because of the abortion issue, but he walked that statement back when he faced criticism.

He now won't say how he will vote.

Hamtramck has long been a Democratic stronghold.

Hamtramck Mayor Ameer Ghalib has sort of waded into that debate, saying on his Facebook page:

"I notice an unprecedented mass coup against Democratic Party among minorities in Mashjen, possibly resulting in a mid-election setback." The Review asked him

whether he is also voting for the Republican party. He said, "I'm a Demo-

crat, but I'm a leader, not a follower. I agree with some

policies, and I disagree with some others."

Asked if he supports

Proposal 3, he declined to take a side publicly.

"I won't comment on anything else to minimize the division within our community."

Former Mayor Karen Maiewski, who lost her bid for re-election last year to Ghalib, has been outspoken on her Facebook page in support of abortion.

She is also a supporter of Democratic candidates.

The Review also reached out to state Rep. Abraham Aiyash (D), a Hamtramck resident who is seeking re-election in a district that includes Hamtramck, as to what his position is on abortion, but he did not respond.

As for the school board race, Ghalib said he supports the following candidates: Alturki (the write-in candidate), Algahaim and Obaid.

For those who wish to vote by absentee ballot, there is still time to get one. AV (absentee voter) ballots are available at the city clerk's office in city

Those who already have one but have not sent it back, at this point, it's being advised to hand deliver the ballot to city hall in order to prevent a delay from mailing it.

As of Tuesday, 1,969 AV ballots have been issued in Hamtramck, with 859 already returned, according to the Michigan Secretary of State office.

Statewide, there is a record number of people voting by absentee ballot.

For those who have not registered to vote, there is still time to do so - even on election day. At this point, the best way to register is to go to the city clerk's office in city hall. You'll need proof of residency to vote in Hamtramck.



City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Aug. 9, and all councilmembers, except for Mohammed Hassan, were present.

During public comment, a resident urged the council to reject a request for a proposed tax abatement to redevelop the former Missant site on Conant.

"It doesn't make financial sense," the resident said.

The resident explained that it will cost the city more money in road repairs, due to an increase in truck traffic around the

Russ Gordon, Chairman of the city's Human Relations Commission, said he was "devastated" over Mayor Ameer Ghalib's accusation that Gordon lied about how a pride flag came to be displayed on a city flagpole on Jos. Cam-

(Gordon has been single-handedly raising funds for the flags each year, and maintaining them. The pride flag was donated. There has been a backlash by some in the community over the city displaying the flag.)

Gordon said "it's the God's-honest truth" that he was asked to raise the flag.

He said the display of international flags, and others, makes people "feel good ... and accepted in the community."

He further said that "religious dogma does not justify bigotry."

Ghalib denied that he had said that Gordon lied. Gordon countered that he has a recording of the mayor saying that, but Ghalib challenged Gordon to show him the recording.

In other matters, Lynn Blasey said that she is excited about the restrooms being built at Veterans Park, but is concerned about the wear and tear on

the facility.

Nasr Hussain said the city should not take sides

on the pride flag, nor to "killing babies" – apparently referring to abortion. Bill Meyer, of the non-prof-

it organization OneHamtramck, said the display of the pride flag was "illegal."

A lengthy presentation was made on the proposed tax abatement for the former Missant site, which would clear the way for its redevelopment.

The company that is planning the development has asked for a 10-year tax freeze on the site's current yearly property tax payments. The site generates about \$60,000 a year in property taxes.

Some of the buildings at the site cannot be used, and must instead be razed. A new building will be

constructed there. The location would be used by a company called

Zbox Global, which is an e-commerce company that sells truck parts.

The company plans to hire 75 new employees, who would then be paying city income taxes.

City Attorney James Allen (who has since resigned) said there are also environmental issues at the site.

(The site was where a previous company manufactured plastic automobile parts.)

Konrad Maziarz, of the city's Assessor's Office, said this proposal "is a tool to modernize an area."

He also pointed out that, out of the \$60,000 in property taxes that the site currently generates, only \$19,000 goes to the

city's coffers. In public comment, several Zbox employees praised the company, and

said it is "committed" to Hamtramck. Lynn Blasey spoke in

favor of granting the tax abatement.

"If we don't take advantage of opportunities like

she said.

Nasr Hussain said the site could be turned over to developers, who will want to build houses. He also said that the increase of truck traffic will tear up that portion of Conant.

He added: "They lied to you about marijuana." The meaning of that statement was not immediately clear.

Bill Meyer said he doesn't trust what corporations say.

"Corporations' bottom line is to make a profit. As soon as they stop making a profit, they're out of here," Meyer said.

He added: "I don't think the deal is fair."

Councilmember Khalil Refai said that a 10-year abatement is too long, and offered a counter-proposal for a six-year abatement.

"We're being fair to both

sides," he said. Councilmember Amanda Jaczkowski disagreed with Refai, saying that six years is "too short."

She added that she is confident that the company won't leave Hamtramck once the abatement period expires.

Councilmember Naveem Choudhury agreed with Jaczkowski, saying that Hamtramck "doesn't have much choice."

City Attorney Allen said that approving the abatement "sends a signal" to others considering development in the city.

Allen noted that "Facebook warriors" have been attacking the proposal and spreading misinformation.

The council eventually motioned to put forward the six-year abatement proposal but also postponed a vote on the matter.

In another matter, the council approved a program with the Homeowners Assistance Fund, which helps homeowners who are struggling financially due to the covid pandemic.


