February is for heart lovers

Just about everyone knows that February is Valentine's Day month.

But how many of you were aware that it also just happens to be Heart Health Month as well and here, we're guessing that you can see the tie-

To that end, CCA Health Michigan, an integrated healthcare organization operating in the state, wanted to help bring awareness to some facts about the human heart, as well as give a quick list of four major things anyone can do to better their own heart healthiness.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, heart disease is the single leading cause of death for men and women, and that cuts across most racial and ethnic groups in the U.S.

In fact, minorities are affected even more that their white counterparts: Black men have a 70 percent higher risk of heart disease than their white counterparts. Black women are 50 percent more likely to have heart failure, versus both white men and women.

Hispanic women are more than twice as likely - and Native American more than three times as likely - to be, or end up, diabetic, versus white women - a big heart disease "red flag."

Council is seeking a pay raise

The city council wants to triple their yearly salary, as well as double that of the mayor. At last week's council

meeting, the council approved a resolution to have voters change the city charter to allow the increase. City council members

are currently paid \$3,249 each year, but the proposed increase would raise their pay to \$9,749. That would come out

to a total of \$32,500 more for five of the councilmembers.

For the sixth councilmember, who is the mayor pro tem, the increase would go from \$4,874 to \$11,374 a year. That's an increase of \$6.500.

And for the mayor, the current yearly salary of \$6,499 would go up to \$12,998, which is also a \$6,500 increase for the year.

The total increase for the council and mayor is \$45,500 for the year.

The yearly salaries are based on a percentage of the governor's salary. For council, it's currently 2 percent, for the mayor pro tem it's 3 percent and the mayor's is 4 percent.

The change, if approved would change that to 6, 7, and 8 percent respectively.

Councilmember hammed Hassan, who is mayor pro tem, proposed the change, and justified the increase because the cost of living has increased.

"It's not only money, it's time and respect," Hassan said.

He added that the current compensation has prevented residents with "talent" from running for office.

Hassan also noted that **Continued on page 4**

the Detroit City Council just increased their salaries, although their positions are full-time, and include benefits and staff.

Councilmember Amanda Jaczkowski, who is in her first term, said it's also a matter of the amount of time each member puts into the job, including time spent outside of actual meetings, such as doing research or preparing for committee meetings.

City Manager Max Garbarino said the increase "won't make or break us" financially.

This isn't the first time the council considered a pay raise for itself. Councilmember Nayeem Choudhury earlier proposed an increase, but he quickly backed off his resolution after public

The salary proposal will be on the August Primary Election ballot. The council will also be asking voters to approve two other city charter changes.

Councilmembers and the mayor want a raise. Do they deserve it?

bers may have a hard sell when it comes to convincing voters to give them raises.

We're not going to rush to judgment on this one but, instead, allow the city council to both explain and defend its position.

And we advise the public to also hold off on making knee-jerk reactions -such as immediately giving the proposal a hard 'no.'

The council wants to almost triple their salaries, as well as more than double the mayor pro tem's and mayor's. And when we say salaries, think more like a stipend.

The council currently makes a little over \$3,200 a year, the mayor pro tem, over \$4,800 and the mayor \$6,500.

The increase would the-scenes work.

The city councilmem- change that to over \$9,700 a year for five of the councilmembers, the sixth councilmember, who is also mayor pro tem, would get over \$11,700 and the mayor's salary would be about \$13,000.

> This proposal would require voter approval, and won't appear on the ballot until the August Primary Election.

The proposed salary boost comes at a time when the city's financial picture looks grim. Simply put, the city is spending more money that it is taking in.

Councilmembers are justifying the increases because of the amount of time they spend on researching matters and staying in contact with the public.

They do a lot of behind-

counter-argument is, no one forced them to take this role. And also, did any of them really look into their roles of councilmember or of mayor before running for those offices, in order to know what would be expected for the current amount of pay?

Our charter is set up to have the city manager and their administration do the actual heavy lifting of managing the city – not the council and mayor.

The roles of the councilmembers and mayor are largely ceremonial. However, it's appreciated that they take their roles very seriously, and often put in extra hours in so-doing.

But in the end, it's likely that the council will have a tough job selling this proposal to the public.

Police report: Vehicle thefts and hit-and-runs increased in 2022

While crime in general was down by a fraction (2 percent) in 2022, there was an uptick in four major areas, according to the annual report of the Hamtramck Police Department:

- Vehicle thefts were up by 55 percent
- Retail fraud was up by 72 percent
- Property crime up by 25 percent
- Hit-and-runs increased by 82 percent

No actual numbers for the above crimes were provided in the report submitted to the city council.

The total number of calls for police was 12,215, and the number of arrests was 691.

Out of that number, 203 arrests involved felonies, and 488 were for misdemeanors. Some suspects faced multiple charges that included both felonies and misdemeanors.

Other crime categories where there were incident decreases from the year before include:

- Violent crime, by 17 percent
- Felony assaults, by 25
- · Homicides, by 67 per-
- Sex crimes, by 50 per-

cent

- Drug crimes, by 31 percent
- Alcohol-related crimes, by 13 percent.

Again, no actual numbers were provided in the report, just percentages.

One of the top concerns among residents is about speeding drivers. Officers were on top of that, and they issued 1,745 tickets for speeding.

- · Other traffic tickets included:
- Reckless/dangerous driving, 90 tickets
- Parking related, 2,389
- · Various traffic misdemeanors, 838 tickets

One of the concerns in the police department is retaining officers. Hamtramck experiences high turnover, as officers are lured away by higher pay from other departments.

During last year, six officers were hired, with four either resigning or retiring. There are still job openings in the department.

Support

No officers were fired.

A feature of the department was the monthly "Chat with the Police Chief," where the public can meet with the chief and air their concerns.

The chief has also stressed additional training for officers, especially on ways to de-escalate tense situations that could lead to violence and assaults.

This has been a national priority as well.

There has been a call nationwide to have social workers handle some calls that involved mentally stressed or disturbed individuals. That step has not yet been taken in Hamtramck, and would require additional money.

Body cameras for officers are pretty much standard in departments across the county, but Hamtramck officers were only recently issued body cameras, thanks to a grant.



Suspect charged in two Hamtramck armed robberies

With the help of the FBI, a 24-year-old man was arrested for two separate armed robberies in Hamtramck.

Michael Moore, of Troy, was arraigned on two charges of armed robbery and one charge of committing a felony with a gun in Hamtramck 31st District Court on Thursday (Feb. 16), according to a press release issued by the Hamtramck Police Department.

He was arrested on Feb. 13 by Clinton Twp. Police, when Moore went to a Clinton Twp. court for a matter not connected with the Hamtramck incident.

Moore's bond was set at \$100,000, and would require him to post \$10,000 to be released from custody.

Moore is accused of robbing two businesses in Hamtramck: Snipes in December of 2022, and GameStop in January of 2023. Hamtramck police say there are no other suspects in either incident.
