State recognizes transformation of Hamtramck's historical stadium

There are amazing comebacks in sports.

And there are also some pretty amazing ones for sports stadiums.

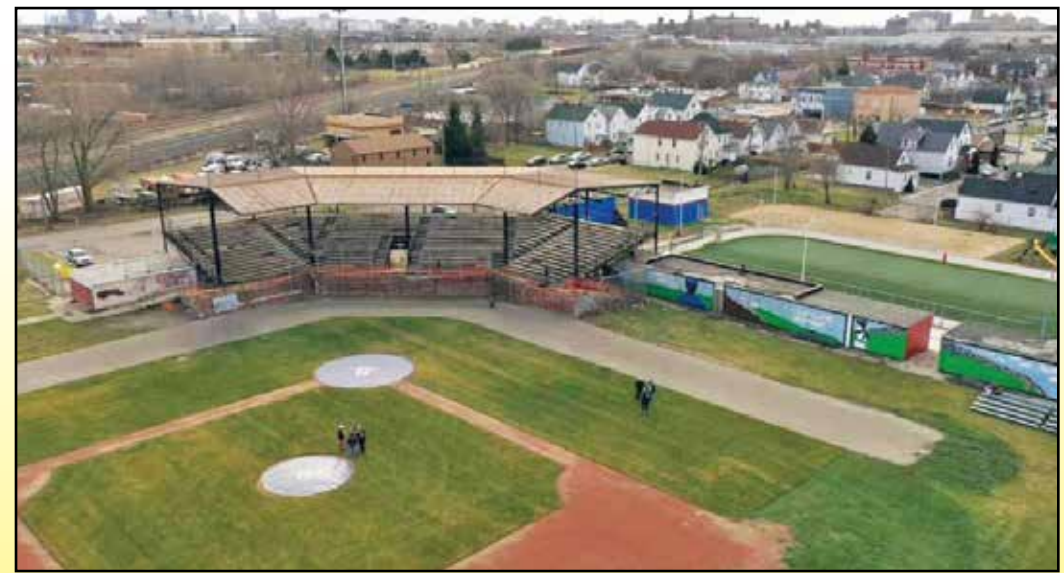
Case in point: Hamtramck's historical baseball stadium, which went from being a dilapidated eyesore to the city's sparkling new jewel.

Recently, the state awarded the Governor's Award for Historic Preservation to the Friends of Historic Hamtramck Stadium in honor of the renovations done at the stadium.

Three other state projects also received the honor.

A ceremony was held last week in Lansing, where Lt. Gov. Garlin Ghilchrist and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) made the presentation.

On hand to receive the

award was Gary Gillette, Founder and Chair of the Friends of Historic Hamtramck Stadium, as well as Tom Niczay, former Hamtramck Public Schools Superintendent, among others.

The stadium is only one of a handful that still ex-

ist that were part of the legendary Negro Baseball League, from a time back when African-Americans were not allowed to play in the all-white Major Leagues.

The stadium was built in 1930. The color barrier in Major League Baseball

was finally broken in 1947, when Hall of Fame player Jackie Robinson played for the then-Brooklyn (now, Los Angeles) Dodgers.

And that pretty much spelled the end of era of the Negro League.

Although they didn't get to meet one-on-one with President Biden, the mayor and city council did enjoy a once-in-a-lifetime experience to visit the White House as special guests.

Mayor Amer Ghalib told The Review that about 200 people attended the visit, which was a celebration of Eid.

Like the mayor and city

council, most of those in attendance were of the Islamic faith, he said.

"It was a good experience, we walked around and inside the White House, attended the president's speech, and ate after that," Ghalib said.

"He (Biden) just spoke and walked out; on his way out of the room he shook hands with people standing in the front, and

HHS students are on the move against Alaska oil drilling

Hamtramck High School's LEAP (Leaders for Environmental Awareness and Preservation) students let the public know what they think of an oil drilling project in Alaska.

On Wednesday, after school let out, members of LEAP – along with other students with the Social Justice Club – gathered at the high school's flagpole, and then walked to city hall.

Many of the students, numbering about 20 in to-

tal, carried signs protesting the Alaska project. Some read: "#Stop the Willow oil project" and "#Stop Willow."

They also chanted: "The Willow project, it must be stopped. For nature's sake, we say no."

Sophomore Stella Hughes explained the concern of the students: "We are protesting because the Willow Project threatens the health of the environment and of the indigenous peoples living in Alaska."

The Willow project was initially approved by the Trump administration,



eventually fell into disrepair starting around the 1980s until several years ago, when its historical significance was discovered – thanks to the research done by the Friends of Historic Hamtramck Stadium. The stadium has since undergone major, largely grant-funded, improvements and restorations.

In 2020, The National Park Service, through its African American Civil Rights Historic Preservation Fund, awarded the city and Wayne County \$490,729 to make improvements at the stadium and to its grounds.

The financial support just kept getting better. The following year, the Wayne County Commission pitched in \$850,000, which was part of a \$2.6 million project being funded by several charitable organizations.

Live baseball games have since returned to the stadium. The actual field has been named in honor of Norman “Turkey” Stearnes. Stearnes played with the Detroit Stars of the Negro League at the field.

In a press release, Gilchrist spoke on all of the projects:

“It’s an honor to recognize this select group of outstanding historic preservation achievements today.

“Today’s honorees represent the rich diversity of our communities, our

inclusive heritage and the welcoming culture that has long defined us as Michiganders – and continues to this day. These historic sites represent critical pieces of the fabric that make us who we are here in Michigan.”

Also on hand was State Rep. Abraham Aiyash (D-Hamtramck), who reminisced about his days playing at the field.

“I grew up playing baseball at Hamtramck Stadium, not knowing we were standing where the legendary Detroit Stars played,” said Aiyash. “I am so glad to see that our community is being awarded to keep this American jewel protected for years to come.”

Also adding a comment to the occasion was Hamtramck’s new state senator, Stephanie Chang, who said:

“Congratulations to all those involved in the rehabilitation of Hamtramck Stadium. This is an import-

ant landmark for Black history, American history, and Hamtramck history.

“I’m excited about the future of the stadium, and the role it will continue to play for residents of Hamtramck and the entire region.”

Also honored at the presentation were the following projects:

- Collaborative Bring Back Calumet initiative, Calumet, Houghton County
- Rehabilitation of Eastern Elementary School into Emerald Flats Apartments, Grand Rapids, Kent County
- Documentation and recovery of the Lake Huron Red Tail aircraft in lower Lake Huron, Port Huron vicinity, St. Clair County

There are ongoing plans for further improvements at the stadium site, which is located in Veterans Park, and it is hoped that it will serve as a diversified entertainment complex in the years to come.

The sounds of warmer weather are not always welcomed

As you would expect, with the arrival of warmer weather and more people out and about, there will be noise. And there are some residents who don't want to hear their neighbors. The number of complaints about noisy neighbors continues to increase each week. Let's face it, with Hamtramck housing shoulder-to-shoulder to each other, we're all going to overhear our neighbors. Sometimes it can be entertaining, and other times, the opposite of that. Now, imagine those living near Keyworth Stadium who have to put up with game days for the Detroit City Football Club.

Not only is there the roar of the attendees, but also, contributing to the frustration of residents is the loss of parking spaces. Of course, parking on public streets is legal, unless parking is restricted to resident-only parking. This inconvenience was the subject of debate on a Facebook page called "Hamtramck Square." On that site, some are calling for the end of the games being held there. Also, fingers were pointed at city officials for not doing anything about it. "Why can't the City of Hamtramck hold DCFC accountable to find a parking spot for their visitors or make it free for them so that way they don't take the residents

parking spots?" said one commentator on Hamtramck Square. Another commentator said the deal with the club is "Like everything else, the previous administration does things without studies or inquires." The Hamtramck Public School District owns and controls Keyworth Stadium— not the city – and the district has a lease deal with the football club. Also, part of that deal resulted in the DCFC investing hundreds of thousands of dollars in improvements for the stadium. While the football club's activities at the stadium don't even come close to being considered criminal, there are some in the community who want to

boot the team out. That appears unlikely to happen, considering the lease. But, it might portend issues to come down the road, when the lease expires. Of course, there are the supporters of the soccer games, and what it all means, financially, for the city. "This complaint is absurd. DCFC is one of the few great things we have in the city, and (it) does wonderful things for our cities image," said another Hamtramck Square commentator. "It brings so many people here who would not come otherwise. Friends, family and colleagues all tell me how they love bringing their kids here for a game."

Covid update... Covid threat over, but it's still a leading cause of death

You can scratch off COVID-19 as being a major worldwide health emergency. That's what World Health Organization Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said last week in a press conference. "For more than a year the pandemic has been on a downward trend," Tedros said. "This trend has allowed most countries to return to life as we knew it before Covid-19," Tedros said. "Yesterday, the emergency committee met for the 15th time, and recommended to me that I declare an end to the public health emergency of international concern. I have accepted that advice." While the statement represents a milestone, not everyone is buying it. A number of critics pointed out that COVID-19 is

the third leading cause of death globally. Over 1 million Americans have died during the pandemic, which started three years ago. In Hamtramck, 82 people died from the disease during the pandemic. While the number of new cases has taken a downturn, health officials are saying that a new outbreak could cause another worldwide pandemic. In an article in The Guardian, Professor Benjamin Neuman of Texas A&M University said: "This bittersweet announcement seems more a white flag than a cause for celebration. "While there has been profound progress, this decision reflects the political reality of Covid more clearly than the medical situation." In the meantime, the number of new covid cases in all 83 counties in the state have reported

ongoing low numbers – the lowest they've been in two years. It is still advised, however, to wear a mask while out in public – which is something hardly anyone is doing. There are a few buildings where masks are still mandatory, such as some medical clinics and hospitals. Even the Hamtramck Post office has a sign requiring customers to wear a mask while inside – but, from appearances, few people follow that directive – including the employees. Wayne County health officials did not have the latest update on new covid cases for the past week in Hamtramck when The Review went to press Thursday. The total number of cases for the past three years is over 6,000 here in Hamtramck.

Get ready for an election season

Hamtramck's election season is off and running.

The only local election this year for public office is for three seats on city council. Councilmembers Mohammed Hassan, Nayeem Choudhury and Mohammed Alsomiri are facing nine challengers in the August Primary Election.

Unfortunately, there is only one woman in this field of challengers, and currently the council, as well as the mayor, are all male.

This is hardly representative of Hamtramck.

Hamtramck elections used to attract dozens

of folks. In recent years, that number has steadily dwindled.

We can understand why: holding elected office is work, and then there are always critics to face. It's a thankless job.

In fact, this has been illustrated by the resignations of two newly-elected councilmembers this past year, and a third newly-elected member has been absent for months, for reasons never made clear.

Hamtramck needs serious candidates who have some knowledge of our city's own issues and needs, as well as

knowledge of the limits of what a councilmember can and cannot do.

We are always baffled by folks who want a seat on council while having no idea how the job works – or even an inkling of what's in our city charter.

Some see being elected as a councilmember as a trophy.

We're hoping that we hear from the candidates in the coming weeks about what issues they would like to tackle.

Here's a hint, though, of what not to promise: lowering property taxes. That's not going to happen.

and recently again by the Biden administration.

The project will extract oil in Alaska's North Slope in the National Petroleum Reserve, which is owned by the federal government. Houston-based energy company ConocoPhillips is financing the operation. It is thought the area holds some 600 million barrels of oil.

It will take years before the oil will be extracted.

An environmental group, Earthjustice, is attempting to block the drilling in court.

Alaskan indigenous natives are also opposed

to the drilling, fearing its environmental impact on the region.

But some Alaska officials are in favor of the project because it means an economic boost to the state.

President Biden had promised, during his campaign, not to allow any new oil or gas drilling on public lands, but the courts have struck down attempts to prevent the project.

Biden has since said he had no choice but to approve the project.

walked out. He had no bilateral meetings with anyone due to too many people in the room.”
As for those attending, it was a rare opportunity for city officials to meet

other officials from different states and “network,” Ghalib added.
Councilmember Muhith Mahmood said, on a Facebook posting, that “It was a great experience with different leaders from all over the country.”
At this Tuesday's city council meeting, Abu Musa said
We had an excellent trip. We met a lot of people.”
One person he met and snapped a photo with was none other than Vice President Kamala Harris.
Other councilmembers posed with U.S. Representatives Ilhan Omar (D-Minnesota) and Detroit's own Rashida Tlaib (D).
Councilmember Nayeem Choudhury called the visit “historical,” and he noted that without being elected “I wouldn't have had a chance to go there.”

Ghalib also noted, on his Facebook page, that, before the president spoke, the event began with the recitation of some verses from the Quran.
“There are those in our city who object to us allowing people, as a government, to participate in their various religious celebrations. Like (President) Obama said, we are not Americans or Muslims, we are American Muslims.”
He further said that he hopes “this is a message

to those who oppose honoring and celebrating religious holidays in our city.”
In 2016, Obama also hosted a group of Muslim-Americans to the White House, where he said, in part:
“For more than two centuries, Muslim Americans of all backgrounds – Arab and Asian, African and Latino, black and white – have helped build America as farmers and merchants, factory workers, architects, teachers and community leaders. ...
“So let's be clear: Muslim Americans are as patriotic, as integrated, as American, as any other members of the American family. And whether your family has been here for generations or you're a new arrival, you're an essential part of the fabric of our country.”
Biden also spoke about the ongoing role of Muslims in the history of the

United States.
“There are more ... Muslim Americans serving in Congress today than ever in American history. And it's great for democracy. It's great for democracy when Congress looks like America.
“I want everyone — all of the elected officials here who serve in city, county, state governments across the nation, I want to compliment you. Some of you are the first Muslims ever to hold the seats you have. Thank you. And I'm so proud to see this during my time as President of the United States.”
City Manager Max Garbarino said the city paid the expenses of the mayor and city councilmembers. He said he hopes to get reimbursed by the Biden administration.
The cost of the trip was not immediately known.
