City, schools and non-profit in line for big bucks in state budget

Hamtramck is getting a huge financial lift from the state's new 2024 budget.

That budget includes \$500,000 for a local non-profit organization, NAYA, where Hamtramck's State Senator Stephanie Chang(D-Detroit), State Representative Abraham Aiyash (D-Hamtramck) have an office.

NAYA is the National Associations of Yemeni Americans.

State Rep. Aiyash is a Yemeni-American.

The state's new bi-partisan 2024 budget carves out \$15 million to the city.

The public school district is also in line to get almost \$4 million in additional state financing in this new budget.

The school district is not only getting almost \$4 million in extra financial aid, but it was also awarded - by the state, just a few weeks ago - \$2 million to hire "learning coaches."

Gov. Whitmer has made it a priority to shore up school districts statewide.

This is the financial news that State Rep. Aiyash has been hinting about for the past few weeks.

The Review reached out to the governor's office for details, and this is what Stacey LaRouche, Press Secretary for the governor, says is what Hamtramck will be reciev-

- \$5 million for water infrastructure
 - \$260,000 for side-

walk and alley repairs

- \$500,000 for the Yemeni Foundation, located in Hamtramck
- Revenue sharing for fiscal year 2024 is \$6,462,659
- Hamtramck Public Schools will receive \$3,995,841 in additional revenue, or \$1,347 additional per pupil

State Rep. Aiyash, who is the Majority Floor Leader in the Democratically-controlled state legisla-

ture, told The Review that the city will actually be getting \$10 million for water infrastructure instead of \$5 million.

As for the financial windfall Hamtramck will be receiving, Aiyash told The Review: "These budget wins are the largest appropriations to the City of Hamtramck in state history."

School district is big loser in election

Hamtramck voters torpedoed the Hamtramck Public School District's request for the renewal of a "sinking fund" millage renewal during Tuesday's primary election.

That rejection, by a 2-to-1 margin, was a shocker for some in the school district, although it appears to be a sign of things to come for other millage requests by the city and school district down the road.

The only other issue on Tuesday's ballot for Hamtramck voters was the city council candidate race.

All three city council incumbents survived, but Councilmember Mohammed Hassan might be in trouble in the November General Election when Tuesday's top six vote-getters will faceoff to see who grabs three council chairs next year.

Councilmembers Nayeem Choudhury and Mohammed Alsomiri were the top two vote-getters, while challenger Lynn Blasey came in third, with Hassan just four votes behind her.

The top six include:

tary Stacey LaRouche for an explanation for the appropriation of \$500,000 to the "Yemeni Foundation," and LaRouche said she had no other information about the organiza-

However, she suggested, in an email to The Review, "It looks like it was sponsored by the Senate, so they might have more, if you reach out to them."

The Review reached out State Sen. Chang, whose district includes Hamtramck, on whether she proposed that financial award. Chang did not respond by the time The Review went to press on in a press release about Thursday.

Aiyash, however, told The Review, in an email, that the \$500,000 is for "NAYA's behavioral health program that opened on Jos. Campau."

The NAYA office recently opened at 11521 Jos. Campau, and it's a clinic that specializes in providing services for people with behavioral issues. It also provides a widerange of other social services.

NAYA also has an office in Dearborn, on Dix. Rd.

Gov. Whitmer, who is also a Democrat, said,

the coming 2024 budget (which is being touted as "Make it in Michigan"):

"The Make it in Michigan budget will lower costs, deliver on the issues that make a real difference in people's lives. and help anyone 'make it' in Michigan," said Whit-

"The budget protects public safety, and improves access to health care, ensuring people feel safe in their neighborhood and have access to quality, affordable care that meets their needs.

"It supports our service

members and veterans, connecting them and their families with the resources they deserve, and will build up all kinds of infrastructure so every family has safe roads, clean water, and affordable housing.

"Finally, it continues powering our economic development efforts to create tens of thousands of good-paying jobs, and bring manufacturing and supply chains home to Michigan. ... "

The 2024 state budget totals \$81.7 billion.

newal: 1,507 (no) to 757 (yes).

Wayne County Commissioner Martha Scott, whose district includes Hamtramck, had harsh words for the district at Wednesday's monthly school board meeting.

Scott said she had been made aware of a number of troubling issues that the district has been facing for the past couple of years, and said:

"There were so many things I heard," Scott said. "I can see why your millage didn't pass. You're not doing your job."

Had the millage passed, it would have raised about \$700,000 per year for up to 10 years. That revenue was strictly earmarked for 3 and 4 vote. repairing and updating buildings, making security improvements, and updating technology, among other items.

HPS Superintendent Jaleelah Ahmed response to the millage defeat is on page 3.

Turnout was considered low on Tuesday despite it being a sunny 80 degrees all day. In all, 2,525 voters turned out, which represents 19 per-

cent of the city's 13,249 registered voters.

Out of those voters, 1,531 voted by absentee ballot.

Voters whose precincts were located in the Hamtramck High School Community Center entered a sweatbox during the day. The air conditioning unit has not been working for the past two months, sources said.

While the weather was otherwise perfect, the day wasn't without its drama.

Councilmembers Mohammed Hassan and Nayeem Choudhury got into a spat in front of the Hamtramck High School Community Center where residents in precincts 2,

Hassan accused Choudhury of violating state election law by being with-

in 100 feet of the voting precincts. Choudhury was indeed within that candidate campaign restricted zone on the sidewalk in front of the steps leading up to the building where he was taking a photo with a person.

Nayeem responded to Hassan, saying" You're always talking."

In another incident, a woman walking up to the community center was offered candidate information for Yousef Saed which she rejected, saying, "I am not voting for homophobic candidates."

That reference was apparently related to a controversy involving the mayor and the city council, who are all male and all Muslim. They banned more appropriate venue the display of pride flags on public property. That decision just several

weeks ago is still generating heated backlash against those city offi-

There was also some back-and-forth sniping online between candidates.

Nasr Hussain criticized Lynn Blasey for saying she was holding an election day get-together at Whiskey in the Jar bar on Yemans after the polls closed.

"Guess no Muslims will join," Hussain said on the Facebook page called "Hamtramck Square," in reference to the bar being a place where alcohol is served, which might offend some Muslim community members.

He went on to say: "A should've been chosen. Maybe in the general election."

Failure of school millage only punishes our students

Hamtramck have spoken, and have resoundingly rejected a public school millage request.

What a shame.

The only ones who will be hurt by this cruel thumbs-down are the school kids who depend on this revenue stream to help maintain their school buildings.



In another incident, Flynn railed against Islam, calling it a "vicious can-

Flynn was also deposed by the Congressional January 6th Committee about his role in the mob attack on the U.S. Capital as Congress was about to verify the 2020 presidential election results.

January 6th Committee member Liz Cheney asked Flynn whether he believed "the violence on Jan. 6 was justified."

Flynn answered by pleading his Fifth Amendment right not to incriminate himself.

He also pleaded the Fifth when asked by Cheney whether he "believes in the peaceful transition of power in America," and went on to plead the Fifth repeatedly throughout his deposition.

In the PBS Frontline documentary series, Flynn has been described as "one of the most dangerous individuals in America today" by Ruth Ben-Ghiat, a historian and expert on authoritarianism and fascism.

On the Facebook page "Hamtramck called Square," where the photo of Ghalib posing with Flynn was posted, commenter Michael Patrick Nosbisch said: "Chumming it up with traitors. Great look."

K. Natasha Foreman also was critical of Ghalib: "Seems like Amer has political aspirations beyond mayor, banding with far right QAnon cult followers like Flynn, as the presidential election looms ahead. Be careful whose bed you're climbing into; bigots like Flynn and Trump don't change their colors. Just hating gay people isn't enough for them to embrace you."

Former Mayor Karen Majewski, who has tangled with Ghalib over an increasing number of issues lately, had harsh words about this encounter on her Facebook

"Here is a first in Hamtramck history," Majewski said. "The mayor of our city hanging out with a genuine traitor to his country, Mike Flynn. Unless his country is actually Russia, in which case he's a valued operative. SHAMEFUL."

Mayor Ghalib, a Muslim, had this lengthy response to his critics:

"I'm a leader not a follower of Democrats or Republicans. Whoever doesn't show respect to my values and principles, they will not get my support and I don't need their support either.

"The general asked to meet me while he was still in Washington; I accepted the invitation and

showed up toward the end of the event. We had a very constructive dialogue.

"I knew enough about him, and I clearly told him about our concerns and that we don't appreciate the hate speech against Muslims that we hear from some republicans and he agreed with me that it must stop and a new page should be opened.

"The only way to fight hate is through communications and learning about each other, otherwise the wall of fear between different groups will continue to grow.

"And if I get invited by the president or the governor, I'll show up, and I did many times, including going to the White House. It doesn't mean that I agree with everything they do, but as a respect to them and as a way to build bridges. I would show up.

"I have read enough articles and received enough emails and seen enough actions to know for a fact how both sides feel about Islam. The coalition myth is just a big hoax that will not deceive us anymore. Actions on the ground speak louder than words."

While Ghalib says he is not a "follower of Democrats or Republicans," during his run for mayor, Ghalib accepted a donation of \$7,880 from Democratic-leaning political action committee (PAC) called "Higher Ground," according to his campaign report submitted to the Wayne County Clerk's Office.

Those reports are public records and available for view online for free.

According to er Ground's campaign reports, which can be viewed online in the Secretary of State's website, it donated money to a number of state Democrat candidates.

Ghalib's appointee, Adam Alharbi, who was in the photo with Ghalib and Flynn, was paid over \$4,000 for his consulting services from Ghalib's campaign committee. Ghalib appointed Alharbi to the city's Human Relations Commission.

Alharbi was also appointed by the city council to the Zoning Board of Appeals, and is a member of the Downtown Development Authority.

Also in Ghalib's campaign report, he paid \$177 for the services of an organization called ActBlue, which according to its website has "built a powerful online fundraising platform for Democratic candidates up and down the ballot, progressive organizations, and nonprofits"

In addition to that, Ghalib relied on consulting services from Ali Allam of West Bloomfield who was paid \$3,700.

According to Allam's LinkedIn page, he describes himself as a University of Michigan graduate who has a "passion for progressive politics, data analysis, education policy and Islamic scienc-

Allam also assisted State Rep. Abraham Aiyash, of Hamtramck in his campaigns. Aiyash is a Democrat, and is the Majority Floor Leader.

First, let me say that I love my Hamtramck community. The most peaceful, kind, and helpful people live here. Everyone gets along. If there are any crimes, it is considered minor.

You will probably never witness illegal drug activity. We have an outstanding team of police officers, first responders, and firefighters. I would say that Hamtramck is a relatively safe place to live in.

I suppose that's why I have been a resident of Hamtramck for almost 60 years and have lived in three different homes. My family was educated under the Hamtramck School System.

My grandmother, Cora Carter, was a high school cook in the sixties and seventies and assisted in the Sarah Garrett Homes project. As a teenager, I worked in the city's income tax and police departments for three summers. I was employed for 20 years in the legal field and am now a semi-re-



Five juveniles will not be charged

City officials had promised to make catching the suspects a "high priority."

This week, Police Chief Anne Moise told The Review there's been some progress in the department's investigation into the matter.

"The detectives were able to identify five juveniles involved in several incidents of thefts of pride flags," Moise said.

"Their parents were all issued parental responsibility tickets. They were all advised that if this continues, with their involvement being identified, the matter would be turned over to juvenile court for prosecution."

Parental responsibility tickets are issued to parents for criminal acts by their children, and parents can be held liable for damages up to \$2,500.

Because the suspects are all minors, the police department does not release their identities.

The rash of thefts and ongoing threats, including death threats, that Hamtramck's LGBTQ community and their supporters have experienced has escalated ever since the mayor and city council banned the display of pride flags on public property, said Josh Hansk-

Hansknecht is part of

He recently questioned the city council and mayor as to what they intend to do about the matter.

"As a homeowner here in Hamtramck, and a queer person, I want to feel safe here," Hansknecht said.

He said for those in the LGBTQ community, "It has been continued fear, and I'm wondering what the council is planning."

Hansknecht questioned whether there will be a task force created to combat the issue; if councilmembers plan to visit establishments that have experienced threats; and whether the police department will label the crimes as "hate crimes" instead of simply as "malicious destruction of property."

Mayor Amer Ghalib replied, promising that "there will be some kind of punishment" for those caught committing such crimes.

Asked if he was satisfied with the police department not seeking charges for the juveniles involved in the thefts of pride flags, Hansknecht said:

"I speak on behalf of the Hamtramck Queer Alliance to say that we are very encouraged by the seriousness our local justice department has taken towards the recent outbreak of anti-LGBTQ vandalisms and hate.

"It is nice to know that if someone chooses to attack the LGBTO community, there will be consequences."

Hansknecht added that there is more work to be done by city officials.

"We believe the city council and the mayor are role-models to many in the city, including many youth. So far, they have modeled how to take down pride flags. We ask the council and the mayor to instead model treating LGBTQ residents with respect and dignity," Hansknecht said.

"We ask that they attend our big events, patronize our businesses, say hi to us on the street and otherwise treat us like any other respected cultural community in this city. This will make a huge difference in how the people in this city treat one another."

Phillip Kwik, a former city councilmember, has been more critical of the council and mayor on this, and other, issues.

He said the ongoing incidents of thefts and threats to the LGBTQ community "are the direct result of an environment of hate created by the city council and mayor of this city. The vandals and petty thugs harassing the LGBT community are taking their cues from the mayor's and council's hateful rhetoric at their Tuesday meetings. ... The mayor and council are responsible for the hatred they have unleashed. They need to stop it."
